FESTIVE FIRST FOR WARWICK AVENUE

Around 200 people turned out on December 2nd for the ceremonial switching on of Christmas tree lights next to the cabbies' hut by Warwick Avenue station, followed by carols from two local school choirs.



The ceremony was performed by the Deputy Lord Mayor Ian Adams & the organisers of this first-time event gave special thanks to Berkeley Homes & Clifton Nurseries for their support, alongside funding from the Little Venice Ward budget.





Not to be outdone, on the very same night the famous illuminations on the big tree in the middle of Formosa Garden were switched on, & unlike the nowdismantled Christmas tree at Warwick Avenue will be providing some much-needed brightness in the Winter gloom through until the end of February.

WARWICK AVENUE IMPROVEMENTS: MOVING TO THE NEXT PHASE

You may remember that last year Westminster Council identified the rather scruffy area around the tube station as ripe for improvement under Phase One of their newly published Paddington Public Realm Strategy, with the aim of making it a natural focal point for the neighbourhood & a green gateway down to the Regents Canal. Public consultation on their four initial design proposals took place last Summer & elicited 338 survey responses plus feedback gathered through public exhibitions & community events. All this has now been analysed & fed into their Engagement Report, published in December, which lists a series of key recommendations. IS FORMOSA STREET LONDON'S MOST COSMOPOLITAN?

Novelist & long-time Formosa resident **Harriet Crawley** certainly thinks so. She's resumed her stroll along the shop-lined stretch between Castellain Road & Warrington Crescent:

In the last Newsletter we toured the North side of Formosa Street. Now let me take you along the South side, starting at the Randolph Crescent end. I know I have enough clothes but even so I cannot resist dropping into *The Brimful Store*. Shop assistant Becky, from Dublin, tells me the store is owned by an Indian lady called Bhavan who sources the clothes and gifts not only from India but also from Denmark and Australia. Everything here is beautiful.



The shop used to be called 'Pipa' but the owner changed the name to 'Brimful' when her shop reopened after lockdown. She explained that 'Brimful', meaning full to capacity, was a significant word in the Hindi tradition.

Every self-respecting shopping street should have a great hairdresser. Formosa has the *Sixty 8 Atelier*, owned and managed by Sam, Lebanese, born in Beirut and now a British citizen. Like all really good coiffeurs Sam can be temperamental, but he's a master stylist and cutter with real flair and has a dedicated clientele.





I know I should get my nails done more often. No excuse. Next door to Sam is *Cobalt Nail & Massage* (so sorry, but I hate massage). I do go from time to time and am always impressed by the speed and efficiency of the staff, young women from Iran, Korea and India led by Kunthinka, who is from Thailand. Manicure or pedicure, these women really know what they are doing.

Next up we have *The Formosa Dining Room*. This is my home from home. It has the best fish and chips in London. At long last the FDR has a superb manager in Hugo, who is half Polish and half Italian. In winter I sit at the round table by the fire, eat my fish and chips and drink New Zealand Sauvignon Blanc. Through the glass partition you can see the chefs hard at work; one is from the Caribbean, the other from Bangladesh.



The Formosa Dining Room is part of *The Prince Alfred* pub which has featured in many films -- not surprisingly, since it is a listed building that was built in 1865 with superb wooden partitions, elaborately carved, and exquisitely engraved glass.

A hundred and sixty years later the Prince Alfred is still a much-loved local pub which brings us all together. On summer evenings the pavements outside are packed with happy patrons, laughing and talking and drinking, and momentarily forgetting the cares of the world.

Formosa Street is unique: a rare local mixture of nationalities, shops and services. Here, on the North side and the South side, you have kind people looking out for one another. How lucky we are!

.... BUT COULD IT ONE DAY LOOK LIKE THIS?



You may remember back in the Summer a petition was launched calling for this short stretch of Formosa Street between Warrington Crescent & Castellain Road to be pedestrianised. The argument was that the road was not needed as a through route for traffic & could be turned instead into a safe space for people to shop, eat & socialise, as well as increasing footfall for local businesses. Well, the petition attracted 365 signatures which was short of the 500 needed to automatically trigger a debate at Westminster Council's inner cabinet, but it did go before the full Council last September & now its officers are busy drawing up a report for the Cabinet Member for City Management, Cllr Paul Dimoldenberg. The organiser of the petition, Sutherland Avenue resident John Gregson, said that while nothing was guaranteed he was in hopes that the proposal would be taken forward since it was in line with the Labour Council's policy of giving priority to pedestrians over vehicles.

FORMOSA GARDEN: THE BEST IS YET TO COME

We have been full steam ahead to get things ready for Spring and hope that this year will be one of the best we have seen in the Formosa garden.

We should have the first snow drops coming through about now. This will officially mark the start of the flower season, followed within a few weeks by all the daffodils. We already have hellebores flowering in the woodland section close to the irrigation tank.

We are also about to enlarge the tree pits in order to enable the trees to absorb more water during the drier summers we are now experiencing.

And we are planning to top up the gravel paths as there are patches where the gravel has been kicked or worn away over time.

New benches for the Warrington bed & the Med bed are currently on order. We hope to get the name of Formosa Garden etched into the wood as has been done with several of the other benches



Last but not least full pollarding of the plane trees will take place later this month, from **11**th --**14**th **February.** We know that many residents find this troublesome given the unavoidable level of noise & would like to apologise in advance for any disturbance caused, but unfortunately the work had to be suspended last March so is overdue to be carried out.

NEWS IN BRIEF:

- Our ever-popular wine-tasting an annual fixture ever since it lifted us out of the Covid doldrums back in 2021– will take place this year on August 30th, courtesy once more of the Winery on Clifton Parade. Owner David Motion sources all his wines from abroad, often from small growers, which makes for some highly unusual & specialist labels. - This year's rent charge that covers the cost of running the Formosa Garden is being kept unchanged for the first time in several years.
 Despite ongoing investment in the estate and inflationary forces still at work from all our suppliers the Board has decided that exceptionally our outgoings can be met without any increase, thanks to their own cost management & the kind support of our event sponsors.
